

Most parents believe that they themselves have the most responsibility in ensuring internet safety amongst children and young people followed by internet/social media companies and teachers/schools


Q1. What responsibility, if any, do you feel the following have to ensure that children and young people use the internet safely?




Around half of parents surveyed worry that their child may be exposed to violent, hateful or racist content or may be treated in a hurtful or nasty way whilst online







Q3. Looking at the following, which of these, if any, do you do the most in relation to your child/children's internet use? Top 3 done most often





Most parents feel their children have spent more time on the internet during the pandemic and whilst it has been a useful tool, seven in ten are worried about the physical and/or mental health implications


Q4. To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements about the internet and the current COVID-19 pandemic?






Making wise decisions is the quality most parents surveyed want their child or children to have when using the internet, followed by showing good manners/respect and being kind/compassionate to other users


Q5. Which of the following qualities do you most want your child/children to show when they use the internet?




Two in five parents surveyed feel that it is most important for their children's school to make more efforts to educate the children about the consequences of their online actions


Q6. Thinking about your child/ children's school/s, please rank the following statements in order of importance to you. Most important





Three quarters of parents surveyed feel that internet and social media companies put profits ahead of promoting social good


Q8. To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements about internet and social media companies (e.g. Google, Facebook, Twitter)?






Most parents agree that regardless of the role of the government, internet and social media companies should be more transparent and make more of an effort to regulate online content

Q9. To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements about internet governance and human flourishing? Net Agree











Q9. To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements about internet governance and human flourishing? Part 1









Nearly 9 in 10 agree that regardless of the role of the government, internet and social media companies should make more efforts to be transparent about how they operate
